### FROM THE VICARAGE

Dear People of the Parish,

Following the observation of Lent, the hectic activity surrounding Easter, four Vestry meetings involving change of parish officers – in addition to a period of ill health and the regular (often unexpected) duties of parish life – I yearn for something of a break. Well, the opportunity has arisen but not in the manner I anticipated.

The windows of my late mother's house in west Wales have decided, of their own accord, to fall out and leave the rest of the house open to the ravages of our climate. So, I am obliged to nip away for a few days and partake of earnest meetings with an assortment of tradesmen which will, doubtless, result in considerable expenditure.

All of which, I know, is of little concern to you. But I am feeling sorry for myself and so I will inflict this on you.

And so to some matters of (hopefully) a degree of interest to parishioners.

By tradition the grouped parish, ever optimistic, moves into proposed seasonal activities. Up in Shirenewton events have been planned with military precision whilst down here in Mathern, Mounton and St. Pierre there is already a frenzied struggle to secure dates before other organizations do likewise and unearth suitable venues. Anything scheduled to take place outdoors runs, as always, the real risk of inclement weather. Anyway, read all about the enticing events in this and coming editions of the magazine. And have an umbrella at the ready.

Now onto more serious matters.

The Anglican Bishops in Wales have recently issued their discussion document on *Gay and Lesbian Christians*. This, as previously mentioned in our weekly notices, is available in our parish churches. Reproduced is what I believe to be points of interest:

One of the most contentious issues for Christians in our day has been the question of how the Church responds to those attracted to the same gender who seek the blessing of the Church upon the committed partnerships they form.

Over the last eighteen months, we have conducted a wide consultation in Governing Body and with the dioceses to explore whether the faithful of the Church in Wales felt it would be appropriate to acknowledge same sex unions in Church, by offering a Blessing, or even permitting the marriage of same sex couples in Church. Given that the civil law of the realm has now been changed to permit marriage of same sex couples, many see this as a natural next step.

The results of the consultation have been very varied: in some dioceses there was a strong voice for the status quo, in others a majority who wanted to see change. In the subsequent debate in the Governing Body, it became clear that although a majority of members supported change, there was certainly no consensus....

The Primates condemned homophobic prejudice and violence and affirmed their commitment again to offer pastoral care and loving service irrespective of sexual orientation....They recognised that the Christian Church, including Anglicans, have often acted in a way towards people on the basis of their sexual orientation that has caused deep hurt. They expressed their profound sorrow and affirmed again that God's love for every human being is the same, regardless of their sexuality, and that the Church should never by its actions give any other impression.

Since 2005, the Bench of Bishops has acknowledged that there are a range of views with respect to homosexuality, which have to be recognized as "honest and legitimate differences" within the diversity of opinion in the Church in Wales.

The issues around human sexuality that are being debated in the Church will not go away, and the pain and tensions experienced in the debate are not over. We do believe however that we are called to live in love and charity with one another, whatever our experience or convictions on this issue, and we call upon all followers of Jesus Christ to respond with grace and as much accommodation as possible to all our brothers and sisters in Christ, including those who are gay or lesbian.'

There is much to consider in this document and I commend to you the study of it. Please feel free to make your position known.

Reports in the technical press suggest that 'Exploit kit writers' (i.e. nasty people who want to hijack your PC/data/etc.) are targeting Adobe Flash. NTT Group report that all of the top 10 vulnerabilities targeted by exploit kits during 2015 were related to Adobe Flash. The same report noted that the number of publicized Flash vulnerabilities jumped by four-fold over 2014 levels.

At broadly the same time, Computer Weekly was reporting that 'Crypto ransomware has been found lurking in adverts served on popular websites including the BBC, the New York Times, MSN and AOL'. I'm not sure, speaking personally, that AOL could be classified as a 'popular' website but, I'm sure you get the message. Note the vulnerability is not the websites themselves but the adverts contained therein. The hackers target the advertising network and, when compromised, include the nasty stuff in the ads themselves. Apparently the compromised ads are known as 'malvertising' – you learn something new every day.

However, the key point is that the exploit kits targets, you've guessed it, Adobe Flash – in addition to other browser plug-ins.

What does all this mean?

Firstly, it means 'keep Flash up-to-date'. It should be on auto update. However, don't click 'Yes' on those annoying messages which ask you if want to update Flash as 'most common lure used in malvertisements in 2015 to date has been fake Flash updates'. Yes folks, those nasty people pretend that their nasty software is a Flash update process and, just when you think you are doing the correct thing, before you know it your machine is compromised! Bad news!

My advice is to disable Flash in your default browser. You won't get to see a few ads – not that much of a loss. My default browser is Chrome and Flash is disabled. There are still, increasingly rare, web-based applications which require Flash. If you are going to use one of these and are sure it's safe, simply use a different browser.

So you may think: I know I'll get an ad blocker. That will solve the problem. Wrong.

It's been reported by Oriel (a London based advert technology company) that 'ad blockers' don't just block ads they can actually prevent the website working correctly. The example given was that the most popular ad blockers prevented the research team from using online check-in at BA.com and RyanAir.com. They also found that ad blockers prevent them from order tracking and watching promotional videos on some sites. Less than ideal.

This is apparently because 'ad blockers often tend to be "blunt instruments" which indiscriminately delete harmless bits of code that are not related to advertising'. Just disable Flash – it's easier! Google how to do this. It's simple.

On another note I've update the forthcoming events pop-up on the home page so you can now plan your social year around our forthcoming fund raising events. I knew you'd be excited.

### SHIRENEWTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Extracts from the minutes of the April meeting

There are still two vacant positions for the co-option of Community Councillors for the ward of Shirenewton – if you are interested in applying for one of these vacancies, please contact the Clerk (details below).

### Planning applications considered

1. DC/2016/00160 Land at Gaerllwyd Farm, Earlswood Retention of lean-to and a storage container.

Council noted that the proposal is unobtrusive and does not affect neighbouring properties. Recommendation: Approval with a condition that the steel container be painted green.

As there are several steel shipping containers in the community, the Clerk was requested to contact Planning to enquire whether as a general principle they are encouraged by Mon CC and are subject to planning permission

2. DC/2014/01185 Land adjacent to Clearview Court, Shirenewton Reserved matters application for 7 dwellings and associated works on land adjoining Clearview Court granted outline permission under application DC/2009/01061, including details to discharge condition 1 (Reserved Matters) and condition 4 (Boundary Treatments).

Council noted that the splay of the site entrance onto the highway had been improved; that the boundary hedge had been removed; and that the property at the top of the site with no garage now had three parking paces. Recommendation: Approval.

#### Items of local concern -

Grant applications from the 2016/17 budget - Organisations within the community are reminded to submit a grant application form for the £1,200 available from the Council from the 2016/17 budget (please contact the Clerk for a form). Closing date 30 June 2016. All applications will be considered at the July meeting of the Council.

Vandalism – Council was informed of vandalism of the playgroup area on the recreation field which led to approximately £200 of damage, this was followed by further damage two weeks later. People and cars were picked up on CCTV and the police are scrutinising the CCTV footage.

Mynyddbach noticeboard – a replacement noticeboard is now in place.

Vehicle Activated Signage – it has been reported to Mon CC that the 20 mph sign at Crick Road is not operational and the one at the school is on 24 hours a day - they will be checked out.

Grow Wild Seed Kits 2016 – 4 kits received. Grow Wild is the UK's biggest-ever wild flower campaign, bringing people together to transform local spaces with native, pollinator-friendly wild flowers and plants. Supported by the <u>Big Lottery Fund</u>, Grow Wild is the national outreach initiative of the <u>Royal Botanic Gardens</u>, <u>Kew</u>. Kits to be given to the school, playgroup, SAMFAL and church.

### **Best Kept Village Competition 2016**

It's not long now to the month of the Competition. Judging will take place between 1st – 30th June and marks are given for the appearance and condition of the village, village hall and playing field, war memorial, churchyard, bus shelters and surroundings. The condition of hedges, fences, walls and grass verges is also taken into account, as well as the tidiness of flower and vegetable gardens, outhouses and sheds. Bonus marks are given for the general appearance of the village, noting the absence of litter and refuse dumps. BUT, marks are deducted for any unsightly areas.

Last year Shirenewton won Best Kept Village, Best Kept War Memorial, Best Kept Village Hall and was joint winner of Best Kept Churchyard, with the Tredegar Arms being Highly Commended. Can we do as well again this year? Of course we can. It will mean everyone in the village helping, not only with their own gardens, plant pots and hanging baskets, but also by being aware of their surroundings and taking care of the public parts of the village - the entrances to the village, weeding and clearing verges and footpaths and picking up litter near your home.

Planting of flower troughs will take place in mid-May and if you are able to donate plants, they will be very welcome. If you can help with planting or would like to sponsor a trough, please let me know, offers will be gratefully received. The Tredegar Arms has kindly offered to sponsor the trough in the middle of the village.

Shirenewton has entered this competition for several years and scores well because residents are proud of their attractive village and take care of its environment. Let's make a special effort this year and aim to walk away with all the Best Kept Village prizes in our category.

### STARGAZING

The seven stars of the Plough lie overhead in mid-evening. Its classical name is Ursa Major, the Great Bear. In mythology, Callisto, attendant to the goddess Juno was considered more beautiful than her mistress. To protect her from her jealous mistress, Jupiter turned Callisto into a bear. Unfortunately Callisto's son tried to kill the bear whilst he was out hunting, so Jupiter placed the bear in the sky.



The two stars furthest from the handle of the Plough are called the Pointers. Tracing a connecting line from the Pointers leads to Polaris, the North Star. Polaris is called the North Star because it is the closest easily visible star to the point in the sky about which the star patterns rotate. This point changes very gradually with time. In fact, over thousands of years, other stars have been the North Star.

The stars appear fixed with respect to each other, but over long periods of time the star patterns change. The pattern of stars we call the Plough looked very different many years ago, and will look very different in the distant future.

In the evening sky, the bright planet Jupiter is to the South below the constellation of Leo, the Lion. The gibbous Moon is close to Jupiter on the 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>. Looking at Jupiter with binoculars should allow a good view of Jupiter's four largest moons: Io, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto – they form a line with the planet. In 1610 the Italian Galileo used a telescope for the first time and discovered the moons of Jupiter. The four moons have been called the Galilean Moons ever since.

Later in the evening, Mars and Saturn are rising above the south-eastern horizon, with slightly orange-coloured Mars to the right. They are joined by the Full Moon on the  $22^{nd}$  and  $23^{rd}$ .



### GARDENING CORNER

At the moment we are still eating our own potatoes, onions, shallots curly kale and garlic. This is unusual, not because we haven't eaten as much as usual, but more because the weather has been such that the vegetables haven't deteriorated to any degree. We have also started on this year's crops with the first of the purple sprouting and cut and come again salad leaves in the big tunnel.

As the weather is up and down, we have to adjust what we do in the garden in response. Wet and cold weather means we are inside the various garden structures whilst sunny and warm we are outside making the most of the most of it whilst it lasts. In the tunnel, the fruit trees have been flowering away and fortunately it was warm enough for there to be some bumble bees about, doing what they do best, which of course is pollinating flowers. The apricots appear to have set well, whilst the nectarines are a bit further behind. The petals are just falling off, so we will know soon whether the fruit has set or not. They were smothered in flowers, so if everyone has set we will have a problem, as there will be too many for the tree to sustain to any great size, so we may have to thin the fruit out later on. Currently all four trees are covered in horticultural fleece as we are suffering a few cold nights with frost, which will kill off the small fruit-lets. This is just what we don't want as the pears are also coming into flower outside and the frosts will kill the blossom, so the omens are not good for a good fruit year at the moment. Also in the tunnel I have planted the early broccoli, and these are now getting established. The strawberry bed is also no growing strongly and the first flowers are now showing. A job for this weekend will be to ensure all the weeds are removed, put the soaker hose in place and then spread the straw among the plants. Hopefully this will set them up for a good crop sometime in June. One other job I want to do is to put some 'grease-bands' around the fruit trees trunks as last year a number of the fruits were damaged by woodlice and other creepy crawlies. The grease will stop them climbing up - in theory! Whilst it has been wet outside, the tunnel has also come in handy whilst I treat some sawn timber with wood preservative ready for finishing off the new paths and raised beds in the vegetable garden.

In the small greenhouse the hot bench has been turned on for some time and most of this years seeds have been sown. All that remains is the really tender stuff that will be planted outside. These are mainly bean crops which don't like a sniff of any frost to curl up and die. I usually sow these about 1st May, as they should in theory then be ready for planting by the end of the month, when frost risk should have passed. Many of the other seedlings have been pricked out into the next sized pots or trays, and these are growing away in the larger of the two greenhouses. Most of the tomatoes have also been replanted into larger pots and are currently looking good.

I'm currently clearing the beds out in the tunnel and greenhouse ready for replacing the soil. The old soil will be spread across the raised vegetable beds and will be replaced by a mixture of manure and soil from up in our top field. This should help the crops to grow without too many problems.

In the vegetable area I have now managed to clear nearly all of the raised vegetable beds as weather permits. I have now replaced all of the timbers on the smaller beds and added a further four. The intention is to use the extra beds for growing flowers and also to allow a better rotation of crops with one or two per year being rested. Any spare soil is being placed on a spare piece of ground, which will then be rotovated, raked and then sown with a wild flower meadow mix. Hopefully this will be a valuable source of nectar for the bees later in the season. Alongside this area is a further piece of ground that has now been planted with a new crop of raspberries. I had intended to plant these in what was our old fruit cage, but this had been overgrown with brambles and ash trees for some time, and when I went to dig the soil it was almost impossible to get the spade into the ground, so plan B was required! Most of the ground has been cleared and sprayed with herbicide, but it will need a little more attention and then will have to be left for a couple more years before I can do anything with it. By then I may have decided to do something else with the ground! I have one other area that has a few ornamental trees on. I have some Japanese acers ready in pots and these will be planted out shortly. There are quite a few spring bulbs and shade loving plants in this area and I have decided to extend this into a spring and shade area, which will hopefully look after itself from the maintenance perspective, or will at least require less attention.

The deputy Head Gardener has been busy in the flower garden cutting down all last years' growth. As soon as the beds dry up a bit, I'll follow on and dig over between the plants and weed as I go. Several areas are still full of daffodils, despite some of the varieties having started exceptionally early in the year. We have never had so many daffodils in flower on St David's day.

Since opening up the bees last month I haven't been able to check on how they are doing as the weather has never been good enough when I had the time. As the spring has been colder than normal I was starting to get a bit concerned that the increasing numbers of bees would be running out of food supplies, resulting in starvation and loss of the colony. Certainly the numbers of bees flying on the better days seem to be down, which is never a good sign. The opportunity arose this week, so I dived in to see what was going on. Five of the hives showed that the queen was laying well, with plenty of broad at various stages of development, from newly laid eggs to actual hatching stage. A couple were light on food, so I replaced empty fondant icing bags that had been given to them several weeks ago, and replaced with more fondant and also some pollen substitute 'patties'. Hopefully this will keep them moving forward whilst this cold spell continues. The sixth hive has always been the biggest over the last couple of years and unfortunately this was showing signs of a failing queen. I couldn't actually see her whilst I was looking through the brood, and there didn't seem to be any really young eggs or larvae, so I'm wondering whether she has actually died, giving the bees no time to replace her. This spells the end of the colony if this is the case, so I've put a note in my book to check this hive next week and to do this before any of the others. If it looks like she has died, I'll seek out a frame with newly laid eggs from one of the other hives. Hopefully the bees will realise that the gueen is no longer there and will develop one or more of the new eggs into 'queen cells', which will hopefully produce a new queen, and save the colony. It has worked before, so we can only keep the fingers crossed. If not I'll unite the failing colony with one of the other weaker colonies.

### Nerys's Natty Nosh

# Avocado, crayfish salad with Pesto and Sweet Thilli Sauce serves 1s

### Ingredients

4 oz. Cravfish

1 ripe avocado

1 tablespoon ready prepared pesto

1 tablespoon mayonnaise

#### Garnish

Chopped red pepper Coriander, chopped Drizzle of sweet chilli dipping sauce

#### Method.

- 1 Peel the avocado skin and discard the stone. Slice evenly, and place on a serving plate.
- 2 Mix the pesto and mayonnaise and add half the crayfish to the dressing. Coat the crayfish. Place the mixture in the middle of the plate.
- 3 Dress the plate with the remaining crayfish and garnish, and drizzle with the chilli dipping sauce.





The leaves of coriander are antibacterial and antiinflammatory. It is also highly regarded as a healing herb. Coriander has been shown to lower "bad cholesterol" and increase "good cholesterol". It's a good source of nutrients, including potassium and calcium. It contains high levels of lutein, which help protect our eyes and eyesight. Enjoy!

### Lemon Roast Thicken Potato Wedges Serves 6

### Ingredients:

- 6 boneless chicken breasts, with skins
- 1 small red onion, cut into 8 wedges
- 500g fluffy potatoes e.g. King Edward, scrubbed and cut into wedges
- 1 large lemon
- 6 cloves garlic
- 2 tsp clear honey
- 11/2 tbsp. olive oil
- Salt and pepper
- 1 tsp fresh thyme
- 6 sprigs fresh rosemary

#### Method:

- 1Using a non-stick frying pan, dry fry the chicken breasts, skin side down for 2-3 minutes until browned. Place in a large roasting tin with the onion and potato wedges.
- 2 Remove the zest from the lemon and cut in half. Cut one half into wedges and add to the pan with 4 whole cloves of garlic.
- 3 Squeeze the juice from the other half of lemon and mix with the zest, honey, oil and remaining crushed garlic. Pour over the chicken, season well and add the herbs.
- 4 Bake in a medium temperature for 1 hour or until the potato wedges are tender and the chicken is cooked throughout. Serve immediately from the roasting tin. Enjoy!




