### **Gardening Corner**

As I sit here writing this, we have had two very warm dry days (at least warm when you are out of the wind), and the soil is at last beginning to dry out a little. All the raised beds that could have been weeded and prepared, have been, but all of the main flower beds still remain too wet to really be able to do much with. You do more damage to the soil structure walking all over the ground weeding and cutting back, so this is going to have to wait a little longer. Hopefully that the dry weather will continue, but it isn't looking promising at the moment. If we think it is bad from the gardening perspective, I feel so sorry for our farmers who simply can't get crops in the ground. Sowing and planting crops in the coming weeks isn't usually a problem as the warmer weather allows them to catch up, but too late, and there is insufficient time for crops to mature and produce a reasonable crop. We aren't quite there yet, but it gets more worrying as the days go by. Normally all of my earlier sown crops would be planted out in the ground by now, but the better days have resulted in some pretty hard frosts, which is to be expected in April – but it isn't helping much! So far I have planted some broad bean plants outside, which are pretty hardy, and that is about it. All of the early potatoes have been planted under cover in either the tunnels of greenhouse. These are doing fine and the tops are up to almost 18 inches high. I did plant the main crop potatoes over Easter, but with the excessive wet and then sun, I noticed that the soil had set like concrete on the ridges, so I had to break this up using a rake. This allowed the shoots to poke through, but I then had to cover these over with more soil, so they didn't get touched by the frosts. I think they have survived thus far, but we need it to warm up soon. That said I decided this week to sow all the carrot seed. I have a special bed for these, right at the top of the garden. They have two choices as to whether they grow or not. Normally I sow parsnips earlier in the year, but I have had so little success with these in recent years due to either the seed not germinating well, or when the seed has germinated, the roots get attacked by canker, or ravaged by carrot root fly. So this year, we will just buy them as and when we need them.

In an effort to avoid the cold nights and the attentions of slugs and snails, I have therefore decided to repot many of the vegetable and flower plants (at least those that I can) into the next size pots. It is a bit time consuming, but hopefully will turn out OK. It means the young plants can continue to grow well, with the extra shelter and warmth, and hopefully when they do get planted out. they will be a bit more robust, withstanding both the weather better as well as the various molluscs! We are getting to the point that some of the earlier sown crops such as cucumbers and tomatoes are now getting too tall for being on the benches in the smaller, heated greenhouse, so we may need to think of a plan 'B'. Normally they would progress to the larger greenhouse where the roof height is much taller, but this is unheated, so we need to be sure the weather isn't going to be excessively cold in the coming weeks. We do have a fan heater that could be brought into use to keep this greenhouse frost free, but it can be expensive to run. A decision for another day! Most of the flower plants are in the cold greenhouse anyway, as they are reasonably hardy, except from a direct frost. Normally these will be planted out, which then releases the room for the salad crops etc., but I don't want to plant them out just yet, although we may need to bite the bullet one day very soon. At least the drier couple of days have allowed us to get on top of the grass in the garden.

To have a break from digging yesterday I decided to do a number of odd jobs about the place. First thing was to get the ladders out and to put the house marten nests back on the house walls. We hadn't seen any martens about, but thought they would soon be here. To our amazement, nearly all the nests had residents within 15 hours of putting them up! We were also reminded by their arrival that we should have heard the first cuckoo by now, but nothing thus far. For some reason we nearly always hear it for the first time on a Sunday morning, so maybe today will be the day. Whilst up the ladder, I noticed the gutters were full up with leaves, so that was the next job to cross off the list! This was followed by cutting up some logs in our woodshed which were too big for the stove and were in the way. As I had the small chain saw out, it made sense to then go and prune all of the buddleias. Odd how one job can lead to others that were unplanned! The rubbish went on the bonfire heap and as this was relatively dry it seemed a sensible time to set light to the heap, which ended up in us clearing a lot of other things up as well.

I had to bite the bullet the other day and got everything ready for opening the bees up to see if they had survived the winter and were behaving themselves. The weather being so up and down but especially wet, usually causes problems as the bees get bored in the hives and start doing all manner of things. They are also more susceptible to various diseases. In the autumn, I remove the aueen excluders, which allows the ball of bees to move around in the hive to reach their food supplies. They stay as a tight ball to keep warm and protect the queen. If the excluder was left on and supplies dwindle, the bees run the risk of starving if they cannot reach all of the food supplies. I have seen it in the past where bees have not moved just a few inches to reach fresh supplies, because the gueen couldn't move with them, and the whole colony has simply starved to death. Timing of getting the excluder frame back on is critical. Too early and bad weather may result in the colony starving, too late, and the gueen may start laying eggs here, there and everywhere, which is also not good. I'm pleased to report that all hives had survived the winter and with early blossom about the foragers were out and bringing food back to the hives. So I took the decision to put the excluders on, and just hope for the best. If there are signs of the weather getting worse, I may have to remove the excluders again, but fingers crossed this won't be necessary now. One hive was not pleased to see me. This was a swarm from last year and I'm wondering whether they actually came from another apiary, as generally my bees are pretty well behaved. That is one trouble when collecting swarms where vou don't know their history. You can bring in a nasty surprise!



### Nerys's Natty Nosh



Chocolate Brownies. Gluten free not Dairy free this time. It is delicious.

### Ingredients

125g chocolate 100ml milk 100g unsalted butter/margarine 175g Agave/maple syrup 50g cocoa powder 3 eggs 75g peanut flour 75g ground almonds 1tsp Baking powder

### Method

Preheat oven 190C/170C/Gas 5.

Line your tin with parchment paper, leaving the paper sticking up at the sides to make it easier to lift the brownie out when cooked.

Put the chocolate, milk, butter, Agave in a saucepan.

Warm over gentle heat, stirring regularly, until everything has melted.

Remove the pan from the heat and add the cocoa powder. Allow the mixture to cool for a few minutes.



Beat in the eggs then finally add the peanut flour and ground

almonds and baking powder.

Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and bake in the oven for 20/25 minutes or until the middle is set but still gooey.

Leave in the tin to cool completely before remov-

ing from the tin.

Cut into square when cool. Or serve as a pudding with chocolate ice cream, strawberries and a splash of Grand Marinier. **Enjoy!**





### **STARGAZING**



The seven stars of the Plough lie overhead in mid-evening. Its classical name is Ursa Major, the Great Bear. In mythology, Callisto, attendant to the goddess Juno was considered more beautiful than her mistress. To protect her from her jealous mistress, Jupiter turned Callisto into a bear. Unfortunately Callisto's son tried to kill the bear whilst he was out hunting, so Jupiter placed the bear in the sky.

The two stars furthest from the handle of the Plough are called the Pointers. Tracing a connecting line from the Pointers leads to Polaris, the North Star. Polaris is called the North Star because it is the closest easily visible star to the point in the sky about which the star patterns rotate. This point changes very gradually with time. In fact, over thousands of years, other stars have been the North Star.

The stars appear fixed with respect to each other, but over long periods of time the star patterns change. The pattern of stars we call the Plough looked very different many years ago, and will look very different in the distant future.

The Moon is just above the bright star Regulus on 15<sup>th</sup> May. On the 20<sup>th</sup> the Moon can be seen to the lower left of another bright star, Spica.

The Moon is full on 23<sup>rd</sup> May. Many cultures refer to May's full moon as the flower moon thanks to the abundant blooming that occurs as spring gets going properly.

In last month's article I said something incredibly stupid, specifically: "I shall spend a happy Easter moving laptops."

Well, I did move laptops over Easter (and am typing this on the new laptop) but it wasn't a happy experience. It was, in fact, the opposite. The main issue was my Outlook email. My email usage is copious, and I rely on Outlook. Over the years I've set -up Outlook with a couple of add-ins and had developed a well-honed *modus operandi*. Unfortunately, both Microsoft and Google are moving away from POP email to make accounts more secure and consequently I've had to re-think my approach.

The basic authentication POP uses doesn't include end-to-end encryption and is therefore considered insecure. This means that, whereas previously I had used Outlook in POP mode to access my Gmail accounts, I could no longer do this. So, I had to use IMAP.

IMAP is a very different protocol which doesn't actually download the message from the server to your PC (like POP) but instead provides a 'window' into what is on the email server, just as if you had logged on to webmail. Outlook uses a .ost file format to store a local copy of the emails for IMAP accounts but, importantly, backing up .ost files is a waste of time as you aren't able to restore and recover the emails from an .ost file.

From my perspective, this means that I am no longer able to back-up my emails locally or to another service under my control. Whereas, with POP, I could simply back-up my local .pst file ('pst' stands for 'personal storage table' and was the file format Outlook used to store all emails for POP accounts) confident in the knowledge that all my emails were backed-up and access to them was not based on the email provider continuing to provide access to their system.

Now I'm having to look at how to back-up these IMAP email folders with content locally. This probably means I will have two back-up processes. One for standard local files (such as documents, spreadsheets, etc.) and separate one for emails. To be clear, when I say "back-up these IMAP email folders with content locally", I mean 'under my control'. Once the data is on my local hard drive it is backed-up to multiple other services.

I believe that it is critical that you maintain control over your own data. You may recall that in the 2022, I wrote about a father being locked out his Google accounts after taking photos of a swelling in his son's groin to send to his doctor – at his doctor's request. Google's artificial intelligence (AI) flagged the photos as potential child abuse material and he was locked out of all accounts and referred to the San Francisco police department. Despite being cleared by San Francisco's finest and repeated attempts to convince Google of the innocence of his actions, Google refused to reinstate the account. The lesson is to always have your data locally and not rely on a service provider's continuing service.

The other issue I am facing with email is that one of my addins (SimplyFile) is behaving erratically. SimplyFile is a brilliant add-in which, in my opinion, should be a standard part of Outlook. When I send an email or reply to an email, a little dialogue box pops up and asks where you want to file the email (it provides its best guess based on previous usage) and, for a reply, you can automatically file the incoming message in the same place. This means that you can keep a 'clean' inbox and 'sent messages' folder without having to manually file everything. Yet another challenge to investigate.

### Moving on.

I was asked by a villager what the implications of Chrome not permitting 3<sup>rd</sup> party cookies (see last month's article) were for sites like TopCashBack. If tracking was removed how would purchases be tracked, he asked? A good question. From my brief research you will need to download and use the TopCashback Browser Extension for Chrome, Edge & FireFox. Unfortunately, Opera (my default browser of choice) doesn't appear to be supported!

Finally, I occasionally read the Daily Mail and have noticed recently articles are increasingly behind the Mail+ paywall. Now, as it happened, I was in Spain over Easter and noticed that there was no mention of Mail+ when I browsed the Daily Mail website. I reasoned that this must be because my IP address was Spanish. Sure enough, as soon as I

returned to the UK, I found that Mail+ reappeared. So, I tested my theory using Opera's built-in, free VPN. By initiating the Opera VPN and setting the location to 'Europe', sure enough, the entreaties to join Mail+ vanished. I've tested it on my iPad as well. In summary, to get to read all the Daily Mail without paying for Mail+, whatever device you are on, simply download Opera, initiate the VPN, set your location to Europe (the default is 'optimal' which will find a server in the UK) and call up the website.

On that happy note, safe browsing.


